## Club Newz

On Tuesday, June 3, 2014, Barbara Nelson, Executive Director for Mary's Shelter addressed our club members. This organization, in Barbara's words, is in support of "Respecting Human Life from Womb to Tomb".

Barbara described the mission of Mary's Shelter as follows:

We need to change the hearts and minds of the women who come to our shelter. They can be experiencing fear, loneliness, and they may feel that they have no-one to turn to. WE CAN HELP!

Mary's Shelter has been serving the community for 20 years. They have assisted 1,000 mothers and babies during these 2 decades. In order to help these mothers and babies, we need to meet their material needs. In effect, Mary's Shelter is "Changing two lives for the price of one".

Mary's Shelter differs from other homes in that they assist expectant mothers that are under eighteen years of age. Their goal is to keep the mothers in school and to help them avoid a life of poverty. Many of the expectant mothers have been victimized and are experiencing an array of emotional needs. e.g. Post-Traumatic Stress Disorder and anger management issues. Mary's Shelter tries to affirm for them that "There is a God and that He won't forsake them".

Mary's Shelter addresses their:

1. Physical needs
2. Emotional needs
3. Educational needs
4. Spiritual needs

The staff teaches each girl to be a nurturing mother, even though they didn't have a good role model themselves. They have parenting goals assigned. An example might be that they read to their child.

### HERE'S HOW SERRA MEMBERS CAN HELP!

First, pray for the mothers, babies and their staff

Second, volunteer to help by perhaps driving girls to their doctor's appointments

Third, share our news with "in need" girls though Pro-Life ministry

Our Thanks go out to Mary's Shelter for the wonderful work that they are doing in assisting young expectant mothers, their children, and their families. Let us all do what we can to assist them in this mission!

The speaker at the June 17 meeting was Professor Father Francois Beyrouti, pastor of Holy Cross Melkite Catholic Church in Placentia, Ca. He was born in Beirut and at the age of four his parents immigrated to Vancouver. Father Francois has an M.A. and Ph.D. in Theology.

Within the Catholic Church there are five rites: 1) Roman (or Latin), 2) Byzantine (including Russian, Slavic and Greek), 3) Syrian, 4) Armenian and 5) Coptic (Egypt). These five are not divisions because the Catholic Church is apostolic.

After Jesus' resurrection, the Apostles spread out to start the church. These churches developed their own rituals.

They have a common faith in the true presence and a reverence to Mary. In the Eastern rite churches the priest has his back to the congregation and he faces east where the sun rises as Christ is a light to the world.

Father Francois brought several icons to share with us. Icons are mentioned in the book of Genesis-the word meaning image. God made man in his own image in creating an icon in a human person, an icon of himself-Jesus. Writing icons presents a theology. An iconographer must follow rules. Colors are important. Jesus is seen wearing red outer garments, a sign of divinity/royalty. A blue outer garment is the color of water, earth and humanity and creation. Mary carried the divine, is seen pointing the way to Christ. She is never portrayed by herself or given a name in icons. Instead she is identified by title-Mother of God. Jesus is clothed in white at the Nativity, Transfiguration and Resurrection.

### Loving---

That is deeper than the mystery of each person---though each of us may seek to authentically strengthen our honest and open loving of our lives, the people in our relationships, the search for our home and safety in God. Loving shapes the core of creation, evolution, the history of human growth as a people of the earth and the universe---not just ours, but the loving of the One sending us forth and at the same time stretching out to meet us in our now and our future. God's loving is personal. God's loving loves you and me. God is calling us into ever deeper love and acceptance of our faith in the Father, the Son, the Holy Spirit---knowing that that love is freeing us to free ourselves from unforgiveness, from fear and resentments, from the suspicion that the earth, the now, is all there is. All religions are proclaiming this God, this loving God, this healing God. And each day we have the opportunity to recognize, to say "yes", to participate in this loving. This is the message of the book on the Sacred Heart of the World. This book seeks to help us find our way again into loving the God who, in loving us, is making and enabling us to still be having a wonderful summer, and I hope you do too.

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### The Sisters of St Joseph in France (1650's to 1790's)

Rooted in prayer and daily service of the people in the neighborhoods where they were living, the SOSJ became known for helping the poor and sick in their homes, providing refuge for widows and orphans, teaching religious education and a trade to girls and young women, and shouldering the burden of social work in villages throughout central France. Often there was no one else to do it. Hospitals and schools emerged where the Sisters served, and even a pharmacy was maintained. The Sisters even served in prisons. As villagers, the wealthy, and government leaders grew to recognize the importance of these social service centers, the Sisters in those centers were recognized for their importance to the development of the villages and towns. When French society and government fell into chaos during the French Revolution, the visible structures of the Church and of religious congregations who were serving the poor were radically affected. Church property was confiscated and the Sisters were forbidden to live in convents. Many of the Sisters of St. Joseph dispersed, hiding from those who persecuted. Some were imprisoned. Some (St. Jeanne Marie Aubert, Sr. Marie Anne Garnier, Mother St. Croix, Sr. Madeline and Sr. Toussaint were guillotined. Today in 2014, there are other examples of such religious persecution, hiding, martyrdom---in Africa, in the Middle East, in Asia. We can read about it, hear about it, and be horrified by it. In praying for, and working for, our world and our people of faith, we today are building the heart of our humanity's future. Events of the past and present, both, help us recognize the needs of our world and the invitations of our God to do what we can as a compassionate presence to those suffering.
