

Sr. Louise Ann looks on as Sr. Jane Delisle, CSJ shares her presentation on "vocation" during our meeting on May 1st.

Sr. Jane De Lisle enlightened our Serra group on May 1, with her presentation on evangelical vows. Sr. Jane is the Director of Novices & Formation at the Sisters of St. Joseph; she is also the co-director of Emmaus Spiritual Ministries. The sisters take vows of poverty, chastity and obedience. Speaking on the subject of poverty, Sr. Jane imparted that the sisters need to be responsible with their spiritual and financial gifts. "We must use what we have wisely." Every person in Christian community needs to share with those who have not. Everything we have comes from the community and is part of the community. It is not "mine"; it is "ours." Sr. Jane described celibacy as a gift. We are women in love with God and with God's people. Whatever we receive from God, we give it away. We are called to be God's love in the world. As to obedience, she stated that we are obedient to God; we listen to the word of God and live it. Obedience only works with humility. Humility teaches us how to live the vows. We are asked to do things according to our gifts. The sisters realize that their life is not their own. It is not about power, pleasure or prestige. Sometimes that means saying no to oneself for the sake of another.

Sr. Louise, our Spiritual Advisor, went on to explain how she has personally lived each of the vows. At her parents' 50th wedding anniversary, she was omitted when separate family pictures were taken of her siblings and their spouses. Later, a photo was taken of her and her parents. The vow of obedience meant assuming a desk job as General Secretary of the Council rather than a desired return to teaching. With regard to poverty, the sisters each write their own wills. Upon receiving an inheritance, the money is put into a patrimony fund and each sister can determine how the money is to be spent within the community. Sr. Louise decided to give hers to Bethany House.

In conclusion, Sr. Jane told us that the vows free the sisters. We have a greater relationship with God. We give ourselves totally to God. We fall in love with God and stay in love."

On May 15th Jim Daze, City Club member, shared his study of the American Indian, Black Elk whose canonization process is presently underway.

It came as a delightful surprise to many Serrans that another American, this time a Native American, might become a saint.

During a Mass to formally open the sainthood cause for Nicholas Black Elk, the Native American was described as someone who merged the Lakota and Catholic culture in a way "that drew him deeper into the mystery of Christ's love and the church."

Black Elk's love for God and Scripture led him to become a catechist, fulfilling the mission of all disciples. Black Elk was born sometime between 1858 and 1866. He died Aug. 19, 1950, at Pine Ridge. (Photo 1910)

The process for the sainthood cause for Black Elk is a long one. First, he must show a reputation for holiness that spread to others. Black Elk's public and private writings are currently being collected and examined. This documentary phase can take many years. Last February, Bishop Robert Gruss of Rapid City, S.D. appointed Bill White, as the diocesan postulator of Black Elk's sainthood cause. White is an enrolled member of the Oglala Sioux Tribe on the Pine Ridge Reservation. Deacon Ben Black Bear is translating some of Black Elk's writings from Lakota to English. Black Elk was a revered holy man among the Lakota who bridged the gap between traditional native spirituality and Catholicism. "[Black Elk] showed you did not have to choose between the two. He did not abandon his native ways when he became a Christian. To him it was together—praying to the one God."

Jim Daze has spent his career as financial professional in the real estate and oil and gas industries and as a corporate tax accountant. He obviously has a serious interest in and love for the history of the Native Americans and our Serra Club was most fortunate to have him share his passion and considerable knowledge with us.

BEVERLY TRUZZOLINO




