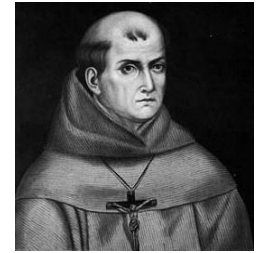

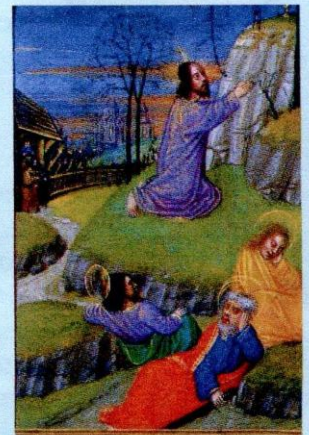

PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE



Dear Serra friends,
As we begin a new decade and reflect back on all the happenings of the last decade, the one word that can best describe the past is CHANGE. In every area of our lives so much has changed in society, in

our beloved Church, and in our lives. However, the one thing that remains constant is the need for each of us to pray with fire in our hearts and for an increase in vocations to the priesthood and other religious. In Luke 10:2 reads, “The harvest is plentiful, but the laborers are few.”

Pat Manzo and I attended the Serra Rally 2020 in Ventura January 15-18. As the program unfolded,

how I wished that all Serrans could have shared this experience and that each of our members could have participated in this outstanding Serra Rally. The theme was Creating a Culture of Vocations.

Bishop Robert Barron celebrated our closing Mass on Saturday evening and share a story that touched my heart. He told of a Chicago priest whose top priority was to work tirelessly in his diocese planting seeds for vocations. He did that extremely well. At his final Mass before he left for his retirement, he took off his shoes and placed them on the altar. As he walked off the altar, in a raised voice, he asked, **Who will fill these shoes?** What a powerful message, both visually and vocally. His question is still resounding in my head, “who will fill these shoes?” Can we imagine...a culture of vocations so strong that each parish produce one priestly

ordination per year? St. Mary's Church in Hudson, Ohio has produced a vocation each year since 2013. One priest in 2013, one priest in 2014, one priest in 2015, one in 2016, one in 2017, one in 2018, and finally one in 2019. I'd say they had quite a roll going at that parish. How did this happen? It took a whole lot of seeds planted for vocations by so many people who pray continually for God to help them pray and plant the seeds along the path. We need so many more good priests. So many older priests are at the age of retirement. Perhaps a new Year's resolution for each of us to make is to continually ask God to show us how to increase our ability to pray for an increase of vocations, and what can we do in our own little world to plant seeds and to help to fill those empty shoes.
